


Current Book Recommendations: Fiction

Recommended by **Kristen Green**, Marketing Associate, Edwards







***Guests on Earth* by Lee Smith**




The Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern

usual summer novel. Recommended for those who seek mysterious experiences and are comfortable with the unexplained and bizarre.”




The Book Thief by Markus Zusak


The book was turned into a movie that recently showed in Carbondale. I highly recommend it.”




***The Goldfinch* by Donna Tartt**




***The Wives of Los Alamos: A Novel* by Tarashea Nesbit**




Bend, Not Break by Ping Fu

detail by detail (like in "Slumdog Millionaire")—helped her be the person she is today and grow and change as her world and opportunities changed."




Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln by Doris Kearns Goodwin

I Wish He'd Taught Me How to Shave by Dave Landers



Per Kelli, “Terry Tempest Williams was given her mother’s journals when she died. When Terry opened them, all of the pages were blank. Terry




Per Erin, “This is a short but powerful meditation on the things that fill our lives.”

Rough-Hewn Land: A Geologic Journey from California to the Rocky Mountains by Keith Heyer Meldahl






Pandora's Lunchbox: How Processed Food Took Over the American Meal by Melanie Warner


Love with a Chance of Drowning: A Memoir by Torre DeRoche




No god but God: The Origins and Evolution of Islam


insight into how today's Islamic unrest has grown out of this evolution.”



tines. Small changes and some risk taking brought her a fresh perspective on life. Definitely intriguing and an idea to consider doing!”




Per Laura, “*The Intouchables* is an inspiring story about an unlikely friendship. This film follows two men during their journey and shows what it is to truly care for someone.”

Bread and Tulips (2000) Directed by Silvio Soldini




both have to figure out how to live in a modern world while still remaining true to their beliefs.”




Doc Martin Series (2004-2013) Starring Martin Clunes



Per Karen on *Their Eyes....*, “Wonderful to read and listen to on books on tape (get the one with narration by Ruby Dee).”








Downhill Racer (1969)
